Region 11 Overview

Region 11 is comprised of a single county: Los Angeles, with approximately 10.4 million residents representing urban, suburban and rural areas. There are 80 districts in the region serving approximately 1.7 million K-12 students. The 15 Region 11 demonstration projects focus on suicide prevention and self-injury, bullying prevention and depression.

Project 1: Suicide Prevention Training

Overview

This project focuses on providing LA county school districts the necessary resources to empower school personnel to prevent suicide; identify and intervene with suicidal and self-injurious students; and how to proceed in the aftermath of student or staff member death by suicide. Emphasis will be placed on technical assistance to districts to initiate, change or update policies and procedures with regard to suicide prevention. Training will feature the best practices and promising strategies of the Los Angeles County Office of Education (LACOE) *Youth Suicide Prevention Project*; SAMHSA's *Preventing Suicide: Toolkit for High Schools;* and AFSP/SPRC's *After a Suicide: Toolkit for Schools.*

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Project 2: Parent Education

Overview

This project provides presentations to parents on their critical role in the early identification of children with mental health issues and connecting them to resources that exist in their communities. Particular emphasis will be given to identifying suicidal and selfinjurious youth and educating parents on the warning signs and treatment opportunities for childhood depression.

Project 3: After-School Personnel Training

Overview

This project focuses on the training of after-school personnel in the identification of students at risk for suicidal and self-injurious behaviors.

Project 4: Suicide Postvention Consultation

Overview

This project focuses on outreach to targeted LA county school districts in the aftermath of a student or staff death by suicide. Training/ webinars and other technologies will enhance the model practices found in the AFSP/SPRC *After a Suicide: Toolkit for Schools*.

Project 5: Los Angeles County Suicide Prevention Network Summits 2011-2013

Program Topic

Suicide Prevention and Self-Injury

Target Population

K-12 School Staff, Media, County Public Information Officers, Law Enforcement, Clinicians, Community Mental Health Agency Staff, Clergy, Probation, Foster Youth Staff

Overview

This project will focus on partnering with LA County Suicide Prevention Network and sponsoring their annual Suicide Prevention Summit (September 10, 2013).

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Project 6: Department of Children and Family Services Personnel Training

Program Topic

Suicide Prevention and Self-Injury

Target Population

Department of Child & Family Services Staff

Overview

This project will focus on the training of LA County Department of Child & Family Services (DCFS) personnel in intervening with suicidal and self-injurious youth. DCFS personnel serve high-risk populations of abused, foster, homeless, and probationary youth. The workshop will focus on assessing risk and intervening with suicidal children and adolescents.

Project 7: Hotline Operator Training

Overview

This project focuses on the development of a youth suicide training module for hotline operators at the LA County Suicide Prevention Center. Region 11 K-12 Student Mental Health Initiative (SMHI) will partner with Didi Hirsch Mental Health Center (MHC) to develop a youth suicide component for their hotline operator training syllabus. Hotline operators will be made aware of the resources available through LA county schools so they will be more knowledgeable when discussing community resources with adolescents and parents.

This project will enhance all SMHI demonstration projects by providing Region 11 K-12 SMHI professional development workshops using a trainer-of-trainer model and integrating 21st century tools, resources, and content delivery using iPads in kiosk-mode for all 80 school districts within Los Angeles County. The project will allow school districts within Los Angeles access to high-quality professional development in blended, face-to-face and online formats. Both technical and content support for student mental health resources will be available. Each district is required to disseminate student mental health trainings to their schools and communities.
